Write a short response including an explanation and details for the following:

- Describe the character traits of the main character. (Establish his/her age, family background, social class & status)
- What was the conflict they faced?
- How did they overcome their adversity?

Directions: Fill in the following boxes with text details and inferences from the book while you are reading.

Step 1: While reading, find quotes that stand out to you as being important. Use the analysis questions to help guide your thinking and choice of quotes.

<u>Step 2</u>: When you find an important quote, stop, write down the page number and the direct quote that you want to analyze in Columns 1 and 2 in the graphic organizer.

<u>Step 3:</u> You should answer at least one or two of the analysis questions in the 3rd column to explain why you chose this quote.

<u>Pg #</u>	<u>Quotation:</u> (Quote directly from the book)	<u>Analysis:</u> What strikes you about this? What was your first thought when you read this? What does this passage/idea make you think of or remember? Do you want to challenge or qualify this author's claim? Does something confuse you or lead to further questions? How do you feel about this?
EXAMPLE: Pg. 22	EXAMPLE : "The dream took place in the courtroom. I was trying to ask questions and nobody could hear me. I was shouting and shouting but everyone went about their business as if I wasn't there." - Steve	EXAMPLE: While Steve was in prison, he had many nightmares. This dream portrays his frightening feelings throughout the court proceedings. Steve is unable to explain his story due to the justice system at the time. He had to give up control and rely on O'Brien to tell what happened. Steve feels trapped in his own thoughts, which further aggravates his feeling of separation.

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Mandatory Summer Writing Assignment

Task: Submit 5 journal entries!

- These journal entries can be creative writing or real-life experiences you have faced.
- Each journal entry should be approximately 250-300 words in length.
- Please **type** the journal entries in this document or create a separate document to be uploaded to Google Classroom in **September**.
- There are 5 boxes for each journal entry. Please write **one** journal entry in each box.
- Feel free to incorporate creative writing techniques, such as dialogue, descriptive language, or storytelling elements, to make your entries more engaging and vivid.
- Your journal entries should be well-organized, with proper grammar, spelling, and punctuation.

Writing Prompt Suggestions:

- 1. You wake up one morning to find that you have switched bodies with your pet. Describe your day navigating the world from this new perspective.
- 2. A mysterious door appears in your home that wasn't there before. When you open it, you discover a portal to another world. What does this new world look like and what adventures await you there?
- 3. You come across an old diary from someone who lived 100 years ago. As you read the entries, you realize they are describing events that are happening in the present day. How do you react and what do you do with this knowledge?
- 4. You have the ability to time travel, but you can only go back or forward one day at a time. How would you use this power and what consequences might arise from altering the timeline in small increments?
- 5. While exploring an abandoned building, you stumble upon a strange artifact that grants you a superpower when you touch it. What is the superpower and how does it change your life?
